<u>Raffle Fundraiser</u>

With the generous support of R&R and AP staff last year, the Joint Network/CAPPA conference held a very successful raffle pre-selling tickets prior to the conference. Together we raised over \$9,000. Our goal is to top that figure this year.

Regina Louise

Regina Louise was most recently awarded the prestigious National Adoption Excellence Award from the U.S. Department of Human Services for reducing the number of minority children in foster care. In 2010, Ms. Louise's one-woman play *Someone's Somebody* was nominated for two NAACP awards.

By the time she was 16, Ms. Louise lived in – and failed to adjust to – well over 30 foster homes, group homes and psychiatric facilities. The many valuable years of formal education that Ms. Louise missed didn't prevent her from pursuing her belief that she "would be somebody." In less than a decade, Ms. Louise has addressed and educated over three and a half million people across the nation about the fate of "at-risk" children, youth and their communities. Currently, Ms. Louise is pursuing a Masters of Fine Arts in Creative Writing and Writing for the Performing Arts as a Dean's Distinguished Fellow at the University of California, Riverside.
