M. Self-Compassion and Mindfulness (LIVE)

Patty Franco and Rainbow Markell, R&R Network Strand: Promoting Self-Care and Resilience

Participants will learn strategies to manage difficulty with more ease and kindness. During this workshop, we will focus on practicing mindfulness and self-compassion. Our goal is to enhance our emotional well-being. Mindfulness helps us be more present, while self-compassion promotes kindness and understanding during difficult times. Understanding our flaws and challenges becomes more manageable when we practice acceptance. Studies have demonstrated that practicing self-compassion increases joy and better connections with others, decreasing feelings of anxiety, depression, and shame. When you are more compassionate towards yourself, you can overcome empathy fatigue and fully engage with others meaningfully.

Walter Gilliam is the executive director of the Buffett Early Childhood Institute and the Richard D. Holland Presidential Chair in Early Childhood Development at the University of Nebraska. He is a tenured professor at the Munroe-Meyer Institute, University of Nebraska Medical Center, and a professor adjunct at the Yale Child Study Center. He is vice president of ZERO TO THREE; a past president of Child Care Aware of America; board treasurer for the Irving Harris Foundation; a director for First Children's Finance, All Our Kin, and the National Workforce Registry Alliance; and a former senior advisor to the



National Association for the Education of Young Children. He is frequently quoted in major national and international news outlets, and actively provides consultation and invited testimony to decision-makers in the U.S. and other countries. He was corecipient of the prestigious 2008 Grawemeyer Award in Education for the co-authored book, A Vision for Universal Preschool Education.
