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Federal Landscape

Details of Proposed Cuts Are Emerging

- **Tax cut package:**
 - A partial Ways & Means Committee bill went public Friday night
 - Full details are expected to be released **today**
- **Health care cuts:**
 - Energy & Commerce Committee bill went public Sunday night
- **Food assistance cuts:**
 - Agriculture Committee bill expected to be released **today**

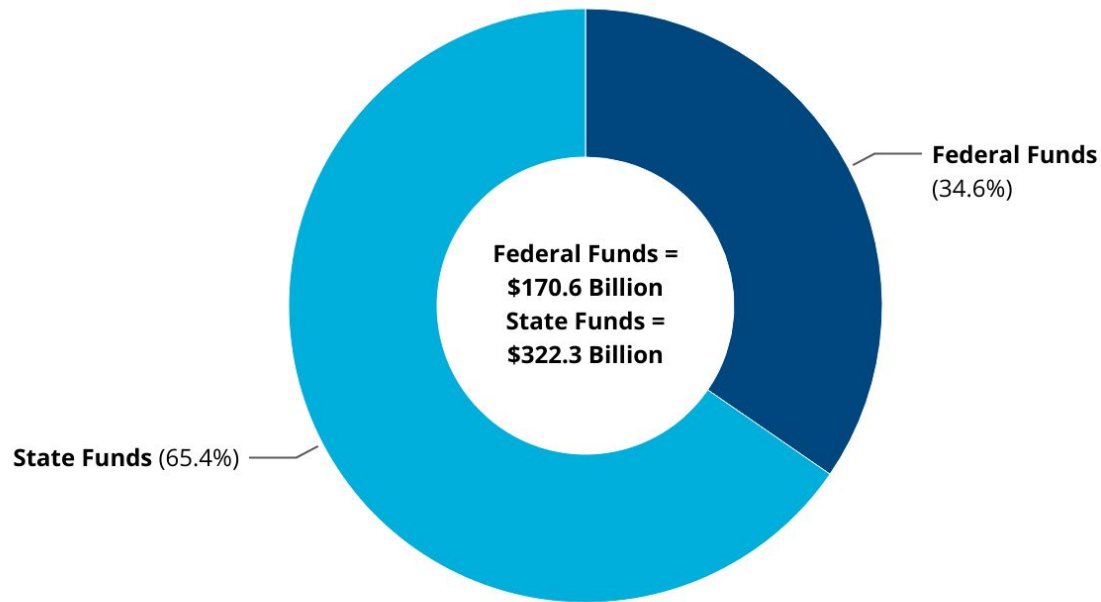
What Are the Next Steps in the Process?

- **May 13:** House committee markups
 - Ways & Means (taxes, TANF) at 2 p.m. (EST)
 - Energy & Commerce (Medicaid) at 2 p.m. (EST)
 - Agriculture (SNAP) at 7:30 p.m. (EST)
- **May 14:** House committee markups likely continue
- The rest of the timeline is expected to look like this:
 - **May 16:** House Budget Committee (assembles legislation into one bill)
 - **May 19:** House Rules Committee
 - **May 20-23:** House intends to vote on reconciliation bill
 - **Mid-June:** Senate intends to vote on reconciliation bill
 - **June/July:** House and Senate work out the differences between their approaches and pass an identical budget reconciliation bill (if needed).

California Impacts

Federal Funds Make Up Over One-Third of California's State Budget

Governor's Proposed 2025-26 Expenditures = \$492.9 Billion



Note: State funds reflect General Fund, special fund, and bond fund dollars.

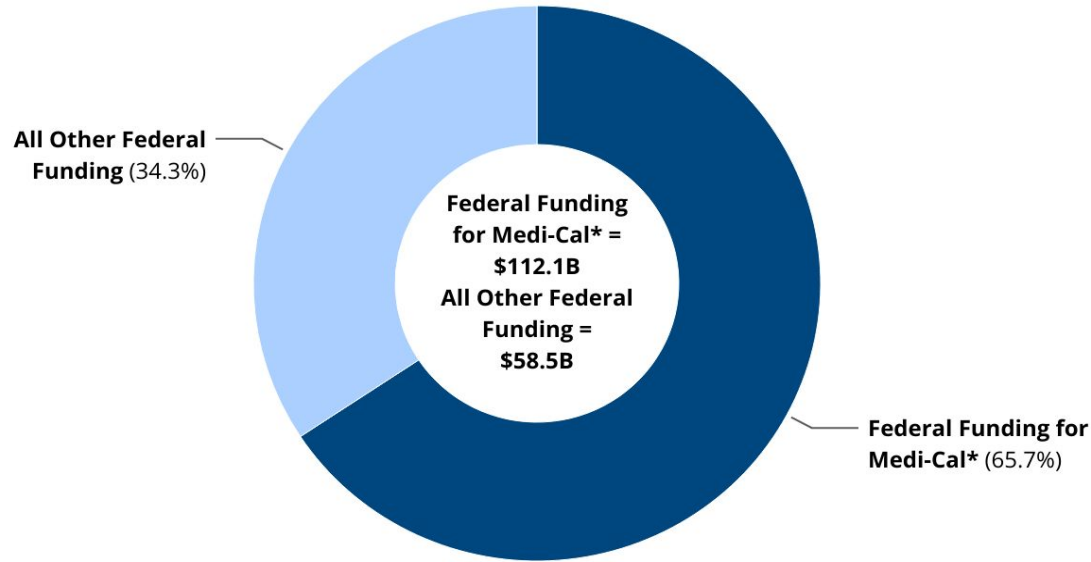

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Medi-Cal Receives Nearly Two-Thirds of All Federal Funds That Flow Through California's State Budget

Governor's Estimate of Federal Funds That Will Flow Through the State Budget in 2025-26 = \$170.6 Billion

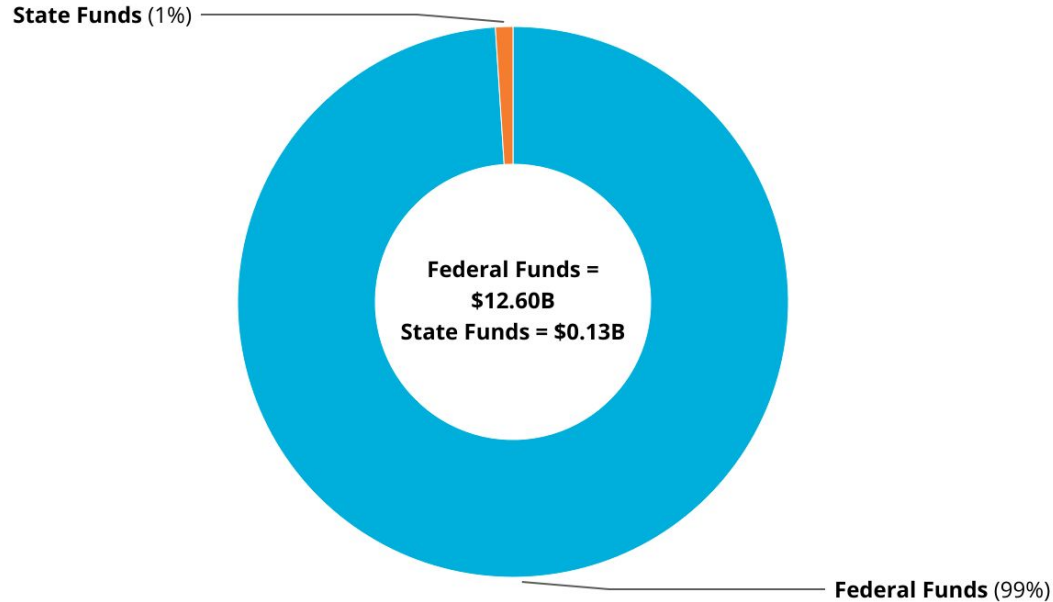


* Reflects federal funding for Medi-Cal benefits that is estimated to flow through the state Department of Health Care Services.

Federal Dollars Fund 99% of Food Assistance Benefits in California

2024-25 Federal and State Spending on Food Assistance Benefits = \$12.73 Billion

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Federal Dollars Support Additional Services and Systems Across CA

- Child care & development programs
- Income support for families, older adults, and people with disabilities
- Housing & homelessness assistance programs
- K-12 & higher education (CCC, CSU, UC)
- Services provided by counties, cities & special districts

Next Steps in the State Budget Process

- **By May 14:** Governor's "May Revision" to the proposed 2025-26 budget


Next Steps in the State Budget Process

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 - **Late May to Early June:** Legislative leaders finalize a unified legislative budget
 - **By June 15:** Legislature passes the unified legislative budget, typically without the governor's full support
 - **Late June:** Governor + Assembly and Senate leaders (the "Big Three") continue to negotiate, reaching a three-way deal on the budget
 - **Late June to Early July:** Governor signs the bills in the budget package, possibly with line-item vetoes
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What options do state leaders have if the May Revision identifies a budget deficit for the upcoming fiscal year?

A Few Options for Addressing a State Budget Shortfall

- Raise revenue
- Borrow from internal funds
- Draw down reserves
- **Scale back questionable spending** (state prison budget, governor's proposed expansion of the film tax credit)



Massive federal funding cuts would blow a huge hole in the state budget that the governor and legislators would have to address.



“Shadow budget” =

State tax breaks that cost California billions of dollars every year, but receive little to no scrutiny.

Some of the largest tax breaks mainly benefit corporations and wealthy people.
