AB 92: Child Care Family Fees

SUMMARY

This bill alleviates the burdens that families face in paying for child care by creating an equitable sliding scale for family fees. Additionally, AB 92 temporarily waives family fees for all families through 2023.

EXISTING LAW/BACKGROUND

California is one of the most expensive states for parents who need child care services. In Los Angeles County and statewide, the average two-parent working family spends around 20% of their annual income on child care.

While there are a number of State and Federally-funded programs that help families pay for child care, families who need care must still pay family fees which can make subsidized care unaffordable. Many California families pay hundreds of dollars per month, up to \$645, in family fees. With limited disposable income, working families struggle to pay high fees and are forced to make difficult decisions about their basic needs such as food, shelter, clothing, and keeping up with fee payments. A recent study found that, in Sacramento County, at least 10% of families paying fees are on payment plans for back fees they have been unable to afford.

These families are at significant risk of losing their subsidized child care which can, in turn, jeopardize their employment or education. This places them at greater risk of reliance on the state's other welfare programs and prevents families from rising out of poverty and gaining wealth. As their income increases, so do their family fees, which then erases any economic gains they have made.

The COVID-19 pandemic has only heightened the need for affordable child care for families and communities of color, who are a significant part of California's essential workforce. In light of the public health crisis and economic recession, parents need affordable child care now more than ever in order to continue providing for their families.

THIS BILL

AB 92 will convene a workgroup of parents, child care providers, state lead agency staff, and other stakeholders to create an equitable sliding scale for family fees. This bill will ensure the revised family fees do not exceed 1% of a family's monthly income and that no family earning below 75% of the state median income (SMI) pays family fees.

AB 92 protects child care providers by ensuring they do not absorb the cost of a reduction in family fees and that the number of child care spaces are not reduced. Additionally, this bill will temporarily waive family fees for all families through 2023 to reduce the hardships of the Covid-19 pandemic and as permitted under federal law.

By increasing the affordability of child care to working families, AB 92 will benefit the economic recovery of the state by helping parents remain in the workforce and achieve economic stability.
