



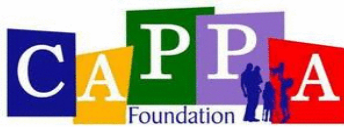

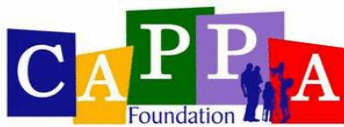
Here's How it Works

Disaster Preparedness

Knowing how to react and respond appropriately reduces the risk of injury and trauma, lessens fears and anxiety, and aids in recovery and reopening of facilities. The lives of children and staff may depend on the plan you have made and put in place.

Outdoor Classrooms

Outdoor environments are essential for young children. Not only do they help a create a relationship with nature, they help build creative problem solving skills, fine and gross motor skills, imagination, risk-taking, sense of wonder, independence and autonomy. While these fundamental skills can happen within the confines of an indoor space, outdoor environments allow children to experiment and discover in ways that indoor space limits. Young children will learn about their own physical as well as mental capabilities and have the opportunity to discover new things such as: How do plants grow? What will happen when I add water to dirt? What will it feel like? How do I make a tricycle go faster? Activities that are considered too "dirty" or "messy," can be easily be done outdoors in an environment that is more suitable for the activity as well as the students. Any outside area can be transformed into a creative learning area!

Mandated Child Abuse Reporting

Mandated Reporters are those that come in regular contact with children through their jobs. Those include, but not limited to, licensees, administrators, employees of child care facilities or institutions. By law, they are required to report all known or suspected instances of child abuse to Children's Protective Services (CPS), police department or designated reporting agency. This webinar will cover reporting requirements, and how to properly and effectively carry out this very important responsibility.

Putting JOY Back in the Classroom

This Webinar will empower teachers, parents and caregivers to bring joy and fun back into the learning environment. The material is based on the premise that play and a sense of humor are fun-damental tools for learning and vitally important to practice basic social skills. When teachers put joy back into learning, kids learn! By attending this presentation you can expect to receive; 1) Specific, creative activities that will bring play back into the curriculum as a vehicle for learning. 2) Build social skills by encouraging role plays. 3) Use music, games and relaxation techniques that teach children to cope and be more resilient. 4) Use a variety of story-telling methods and picture books that encourage a sense of humor. 5) Use specific strategies that promote problem solving and stress relief. 6) How to give children an "I can do it" attitude.

Rates of overweight young children have risen at a steady rate in recent years and parents, schools and communities affect the diets and activities of these children. Positive, ongoing changes must occur on various levels to address this serious health issue. This Webinar will explore how nutrition and movement can work hand-in-hand in combating the future well being of children at home and in early care and education settings. Information will be provided which can assist in having meaningful discussions with families about diet and exercise; i.e. daily schedules, planned activities, role modeling, safety considerations around diets for children and will also touch on nutrition and exercise for special needs children.
